A TIME FOR SABBATICAL AND A TIME FOR...

On Saturday of Sukkot, an 80 year old member of our congregation climbed a ladder in my back yard and sailed down the zipline. Hair flying behind her, a big grin on her face, she flew past the sukkah, past the waiting children, past the lulav shakers and let out a cry of delight.



As everyone watched her soar, there wasn't a person there who did not smile.

On Sunday of Sukkot, Jen and I drove to Washington, D.C. and back in one day for a funeral. The mother of a girl that Jen grew up with had died quickly from cancer. The hug that Jen got from her friend for coming made the whole day worth it. Over 400 people filled the sanctuary. As we recited the memorial prayer, there wasn't a person there who did not cry.

That's sukkot for you. Our most festive holiday, the rabbis called it *zman simchateinu*, time of our rejoicing. But it takes place as summer's green fades to brown with one last yelp of color. And then the green dies, nature quiets, and winter comes. It is, perhaps, why we read the book of Ecclesiastes during this festival:

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven

A time to be born, and a time to die

A time to plant, and a time to pluck up that which is planted

A time to kill, and a time to heal

A time to break down, and a time to build up

A time to weep, and a time to laugh

A time to mourn, and a time to dance;

No time of year highlights the truth of Ecclesiastes more than autumn and my weekend of ziplines and funerals seemed to hold out this truth in sharp relief. And yet, it is a truth that I also experienced in a profound way over the past year with the blessed gift of a sabbatical.

I know few people who receive this gift in our busy, ever moving world. There seems to be a contest to see who works harder and longer, who spends more time away from home, who logs the most time at the office. And so I told people about the gift of time that I received from Emanu-El a bit sheepishly, a bit like I was getting away with something, that I was not conforming to the expectations of a society constantly on the go.

And then the words of Ecclesiastes would come to mind – a season for this and a season for that – and I'd quiet my doubts and rejoice in the gift:

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven

A time to learn, and a time to teach

A time to write, and a time to preach

A time to go, and a time to stay home

A time for self-care, and a time to take care

A time for family, and a time for work

A time for my spirit, and a time to be pastor

A time for myself, and a time for my beloved congregation.

The months flew by filled with these times and seasons.

At the end of a 14 hour day in Israel, I realized that few things fill my soul like helping nearly thirty congregants awaken to our ancient connection with our homeland – fresh pita and cucumbers, Jews and Arabs, deserts and verdant fields, Tel Aviv and Jerusalem.

On a beach in Mexico, I realized how blessed we are with our long-time and gifted Cantor Stone who took care of a bereaved family's funeral. She did it with aplomb, with as much grace and heart as she shares on the bimah.

At my desk at home, I found humility in the power of my writing as people from around the world sent messages about some of the many pieces I penned for *The Forward*, a Jewish newspaper over 100-years old.

Back here at Emanu-El, I felt intense gratitude for the moments I came back to celebrate b'nei mitzvah, to celebrate Purim, to see Student Rabbi Jade Sank thrive, to consult on this matter or that, to just be a dad in the religious school, and then to come back for three months of a job that I love in the midst of this time for myself. To everything there is a season.

While in Jerusalem in July, I learned once more what it means to learn. With colleagues from here and there, from every continent, we plumbed the depths of our ancient texts to find meaning in modern Israel's conception and birth, her wars and her peace, her reality and her possibility.

On The Golan Heights with Jen, Lev and Talia, I marveled at the IDF's commitment to humanity and security, I laughed with my children in the Jordan

River, I screamed with them on the river's one rapid, and I gazed at the milky way in a moment of solitude and felt just how small we all really are. A sense of awe that I carry with me into our sanctuary each time we pray. When you see me close my eyes, I'm seeing those stars and feeling small – and blessed.

On my bike and at my table in New Rochelle, I found my body once again. Changing the way I eat and move meshed well with an August replete with simple childhood sickness that kept me from writing and reading as planned. "Humans plan and God laughs" goes the old Yiddish proverb. So instead of wisdom from books and more articles in *The Forward*, I took care of my kids and myself and I hope to live a bit longer for the effort.

Back at work, back to the daily details of running a synagogue. I could not feel more content to come back; the sabbatical now like a good dream slowly fading but leaving an imprint on the day. My mind has expanded. My soul has deepened. My colleagues here at Emanu-El carried the synagogue effortlessly during my absence, now even more empowered to take us forward. And you, so many of you, you know who you are, took on more than your fair share so that I could live fully in this gift of time and space.

To every thing there is a season and the season of sabbatical has passed. The time reverberates within me as accomplishments, as plans unfulfilled, as surprising experiences that have shaped me in ways small and profound, literal and metaphorical. I am changed for the better which can only change my rabbinate for the better, my relationships for the better, and our congregation for the better.

To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven:

A time for ziplines, and a time for funerals

A time to learn, and a time to teach

A time to write, and a time to preach

A time for sabbatical, and a time for work.

SPOTLIGHT ON THE BAND'S VISIT AND ETAI BENSON

The new, critically acclaimed Broadway musical, *The Band's Visit*, at the Ethel Barrymore Theater, is a must-see show, full of beautiful music, soulful characters, longing for love and searching for meaning. It is unprecedented to see a Broadway



show that is set in Israel, with a number of Israeli and Arab actors and musicians in the cast.

Based on the award winning 2007 film of the same title, *The Band's Visit* features music and lyrics by Tony Award nominee and Drama Desk award winner, David Yazbek, and a book by N.Y. Drama Critics Circle, Lortel and Outer Critics awards winner, Itamar Moses.

The Band's Visit "follows the unlikely meeting of an Egyptian police band and a group of locals in a small Israeli town." In the words of Jesse Green (New York Magazine), "It doesn't feel like any musical ever; it doesn't sound like anything else you have heard. Perfect is the wrong word for such an unusual musical but it will just have to do."

My family and I are particularly excited about this show because among the cast – forgive my shameless kvelling – is my nephew, my sister's son Etai Benson (nee Benshlomo). Etai began his Broadway career shortly after graduating from the University of Michigan's acclaimed BFA musical theater

department, as the loveable munchkin "Boq" in *Wicked*, which he played from 2010-12. He recently returned from the first national tour of *An American in Paris*, in which he played Adam Hochberg, a cynical American Jewish composer coming to grips with the war wounds he suffered.

While the original film version of *An American in Paris* does not portray this character as a Jew, Etai helped bring an important Jewish dimension to the Broadway version, in which the Jewish post war experience is essential to the journey of the characters.

Another one of his roles was the title character in My Name is Asher Lev (GableStage), about a young Hasidic boy in Brooklyn who discovers he is an artistic prodigy. Etai's performance was hailed as "revelatory," "deeply felt and compassionate, rich in nuance."

Etai never expected his Judaism to play a part in his theatrical career, but as an Israeli-American actor who lived in Israel for 3 years as a child, he brings the language and culture he understands so well to the multiple Jewish roles he has played.

OUR WORDS MATTER

The Psalms have always stood out to me.

The words from the Psalms that we find in our prayer book like "Adonai s'fatai tiftach - God, open my lips," which we say before the Avot prayer,

and "y'hiyu l'ratzon imrei fi - May the words of my mouth," which we say after the silent prayer, have always been two of my favorite moments in services.

We see psalms during Friday night Shabbat services, during our morning services, celebrations of the beginning of each month, and holiday services. We also see psalms in blessings after eating a meal, and in our funeral and remembrance services.

Not only do we find psalms in our liturgy, they also pop up occasionally in everyday life. Many people who have survived very difficult situations have famously credited the psalms in particular. For example, Natan Sharansky recited the psalms while he was imprisoned, and credits them with his survival. On October 13, 2010, thirty-three Chilean miners were rescued after being trapped underground. Following the meticulous operation that led to their rescue, the miners wore shirts with a verse from Psalm 95, "In His hand are the depths of the Earth and the mountain peaks belong to Him." In June 2013, a Salvation Army store collapsed in Philadelphia and during the collapse, inside the building, shopper Linda "Kelly" Bell recited Psalm 23, which she attributed with her survival.

The Psalms enable us to find a voice in times when we cannot string our words together into sentences. The Psalms enable us to speak, to call out to God in prayer, to express our sorrow in times of crisis and joy in times of great rejoicing. The Psalms are different from other prayers in our prayer book: they are poems. Poetry is written for public reading, and so are the psalms. Poetry gives voice to the words of our hearts, our prayers, and the Psalms, the ancient poems of our biblical ancestors, go even beyond expressing our inner yearnings; the Psalms continue to resonate with us today, and they connect us with the trials and triumphs of those who came before us.

For my rabbinic thesis, I have been working on a project on the Psalms. The project began with a full immersion into the entire book of Psalms. As I read each one, I marked the Psalms that stood out to me, including the two I mentioned earlier: Psalm 19 and Psalm 51. I soon discovered that, like these two examples from our prayer book, many of the Psalms I marked have a common theme; they speak about our speech, our ability to "open our lips," to prevent using our speech in destructive ways, and instead to have the courage to speak praises and joyful words aloud. These psalms remind us that our words matter.

The book of Genesis teaches us that God spoke the world into being. Our gift of speech gives us the power to create new worlds for ourselves and for each other.

RITUAL CORNER: LIGHTING SHABBAT CANDLES



YOUTH AND PROGRAM DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

KOL BO - SOMETHING FOR EVERYONE

Judaism teaches us that everyone is created "B'tzelem Elohim" in the image of God. We rejoice in the Reform movement of Judaism, which has led the way in the work of tikkun, of mending, so that every human being who wants to journey Jewishly can be a part of our community, regardless of their gender identity, or the gender of



the person they've fallen in love with. Judaism teaches that the differences between humans are a divine act: God created us different and distinct from each other. Every one of us has our own face, opinions, and orientation. Some of us have one sexual orientation, and some have another. We were all created in God's image. The Reform movement celebrates the sanctity of every human being and seeks to realize the divine image inherent in us all. In the Talmud, we learn that Rabbi Akiva taught: The great principle of the Torah is expressed in the Mitzvah: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Ben Azzai found a principle even more fundamental in the words: "This is the story of humanity: when God created us, God made us in God's likeness."

I encourage our entire congregation to be "Upstanders" by attending our Sacred Stories Pride Shabbat service Friday, November 17 at 7:30pm. The service is an excellent way to honor the movement for LGBTQ equality and inclusion. At our annual Pride Shabbat service, we celebrate LGBTQ Jews and allies, and we are proud of our own identities and those of our loved ones. We will recognize recent victories against discrimination and will recommit to the work ahead.

REFLECTIONS ON L'DOR V'DOR - FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION

My life has changed dramatically since I last wrote an article for this bulletin – I AM A GRANDMOTHER! Baby Nadia was born on September 3rd and she is sweet, adorable and has



brought so much joy to my husband Tony and me. We invite our temple family to join us on Friday,

November 17th at our Pride Shabbat Service when she will be named on the bimah. Please join us for a festive oneg following the service.

Becoming a grandmother has reinforced my passion to transmit our Jewish values, heritage and history to the next generation. I credit the teachers and rabbis of Temple Sinai in Roslyn, N.Y. for connecting me to strong Jewish ethical precepts, historical role models and meaningful rituals that have made me proud to be a Reform Jew.

My thirty-one year involvement with our temple has provided my family with fertile ground in which to share, nurture and grow our Jewish roots. This year, 5778, is no exception. I know that so many of you agree with me when I say that this year's High Holy Day worship was moving and meaningful. Beginning with a Selichot service around a fire pit in our parking lot and ending with a powerful N'ilah service and communal break fast in our beautiful Susan Schweitzer Family Learning Center, I experienced moments of inspiring worship, beautiful music and powerful/welcoming messages.

Both Rabbi Goldsmith and Rabbi Wolk courageously and eloquently shared deep and personal exhortations – the urgency to become an upstander during difficult times for our country and the need to look at our own lives through the lens of finite time – making sure to value and not squander it.
