The sacred books of the Jewish people are a sort of time machine. Each successive layer of Jewish writing - from the Torah to today - reflects the period in which it was written. When we study these texts, we discover an endless diversity of perspective and thought. Each generation's interpretation is shaped by time and place, received tradition and folkways, host culture and ethical norms. What do they all have in common? A search for the holy, a pathway to bring God's goodness to earth through our actions and beliefs. This year, we will look at the weekly Torah portion and discover how it filters through the prism of time and through each generation. From the biblical text to rabbinic and medieval commentaries, through the enlightenment and into our own day, we will discover how ancient ideas evolve into the Judaism that we know today.
